15/273. DECLARATIONS OF DISCLOSABLE PECUNIARY AND OTHER INTERESTS

No declarations of disclosable pecuniary and other interests were received.

15/274. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Written apologies for absence were received and accepted by the Council from Mr T Landamore.

15/275. MINUTES

The Minutes of the Council's meeting held on 14 October 2015, having previously been circulated to all Members were confirmed, subject to the following amendment:

Minute 15/263 (6) delete Henry VI and insert Henry V

and signed by the Chairman of the Council.

15/276. REPORTS FROM COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCILLORS

A written report was received from Mr J M Ward, District and County Councillor.

Mr Ward also verbally reported that

- (1) the County's Highways department were ready for the winter with 17,000 tonnes of salt stored in seven salt domes and 51 gritting lorries ready to go out on any given day to salt 2000 miles of Norfolk's roads, which is a third of the network.
- (2) the Beastly Machines Exhibition was being held at the Time and Tide Museum in Great Yarmouth which would appeal to all ages.

Mr I Moncur verbally reported that both he and Mrs J Leggett had attended a meeting of the Beeston Park Programme Board where they were informed that phase 1 development would take place in Old Catton and could take up to 6 to 7 years. Land for the link road from this development to North Walsham Road had not yet been secured and phase 3 would commence on completion of Phase 1.



15/276. REPORTS FROM COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCILLORS (CONTINUED)

Council discussed the above meeting and concerns were expressed with regard to:

- (1) additional traffic on Spixworth Road, Lodge Lane and White Woman Lane if the link road was not constructed.
- (2) phase one development in Old Catton would not provide for much needed housing association properties
- (3) the move to phase 3 following completion of phase 1 would lead to the main community area being left until last and probably not built resulting in a housing estate with no facilities or employment area.
- (4) the B1150 being diverted through a 30mph zone
- (5) the current road network could not support the number of proposed dwellings
- (6) no proposed improvements to the Park and Ride
- (7) Beeston Park will not be open early to the public

It was suggested that the new developer "TOWN" be invited to address the Town Council and publicise this event to residents.

Mrs J Leggett reported that:

(1) she had been assured by Norfolk Constabulary that they were taking strong action on anti-social behaviour on roads in the Old Catton and Sprowston area.

Mr N Shaw reported that:

- (1) he would shortly be attending a meeting of the Strategic Aviation Special Interest Group (SASIG) and advised Members that Broadland District Council was to take over financial responsibility for this group from Surrey County Council.
- (2) he had attended a meeting of the Airport Consultative Committee where he had been informed that there was a problem with the new engine testing unit as heat from aircraft engines was causing the concrete to breakup. He had been assured that the facility would soon be operational following resurfacing and this would help reduce noise omissions.

On the motion of Mr K Lashley, seconded by Mr R J Knowles it was **RESOLVED**, that the meeting be adjourned to receive residents' questions on matters concerning the town. 5.5 Licensing Act 2003

RESOLVED to strongly oppose the granting of the premises licence requested by Sprowston Sports and Social Club on the grounds that:

The premise is in a residential area which is currently being developed with additional housing and a junior school to be located in close proximity.

Extended opening hours, up to 24 hours a day on any given day of the week, is unneighbourly particularly when considering noise generated by people leaving the premises in the early hours of the morning and potentially under the influence of alcohol.

The applicant states that they will conduct perimeter sound checks when hosting outside entertainment to prevent public nuisance. There are many forms of nuisance and this only addresses one of them.

Excessive access to alcohol is likely to promote anti-social behaviour, on and off the premises, which could impact on crime, public safety and become a noise nuisance.

This is a sports and social club where children are welcome and participate in various activities. This licence will increase the likely hood of children being in the company of adults under the influence of alcohol and there is no reference in the application to checking proof of age of consumers of alcohol or what safeguarding measures would be implemented to prevent under aged drinking.

The applicant describes themselves as a recognised club and thus should be subject to applying for an events licence not a premises license which is more applicable to a public house or night club.

Report from Councillor John Ward

Broadland District Council

As Vice Chairman of the Council I attended the Norfolk Sports Award ceremony at the Forum on 11th November, sponsored by Archant, Active Norfolk and Norse it honoured the very best sporting talent in our county as well as local people and organisations who have dedicated their time to helping others in the field of sport. The Winner of Winners was Frances Rayner who founded the Downham Games in 2012 and has been honoured for getting her local community involved in sport.

At the last Cabinet meeting it was agreed that, in line with other local district councils, a free pest control service would no longer be provided. Enquiries from residents would be referred to the Council's preferred pest control supplier.

Devolution: - the leader of our Council together with the leaders of Norfolk County Council and two Suffolk leaders met this month with Michael Hesseltine at Westminster, to put before him the case for a joint Norfolk/Suffolk bid for devolved powers. He gave an encouraging response and work will continue between the two counties and the government to draw up an acceptable agreement.

Norfolk County Council

The County's Warm & Well campaign was launched on 13th November. This is a project targeted at vulnerable groups. This year the Council is working with Community Action Norfolk which has received a £378k grant from the British Gas Energy Trust to support a number of solutions to reduce fuel poverty and help vulnerable people. The Council also launches its Warm and Well Fund with ten grants of £1000 available to assist community projects.

At the full meeting of the County Council on 6th November, Councillors voted overwhelmingly to confirm that the Council will provide the final funding of £10.4m for the Northern Distributor Road, completing a funding package of £178.95m for this 20km dual carriageway. Work will start this month.

On 13th November I attended the Thorpe St. Andrew School Sixth Form 'Celebrating Success Evening'. The sixth form students come not only from TSA but also from Sprowston and the surrounding parishes. I heard many inspiring stories;- one student is now an army officer, one working in a finance company, one is an assistant manager at a nursery and one has been sponsored by Rolls Royce on an engineering course at a USA university.

Norwich Surface Water Drainage Scheme

Dear June

Norwich Surface Water Drainage Scheme

In April this year Norfolk County Council were successful in its bid for Department for Transport Challenge funding and has been awarded £9.1 million to fund surface water drainage infrastructure improvement in the city and north city fringe area.

The funding will allow us to improve the drainage systems in the Greater Norwich area in order to offer better protection to domestic and business properties during times of heavy rain." More than 100 properties were left under water last summer as flash floods hit communities in Norwich and the Northern City fringe causing £2m worth of damage.

Surface water flooding can have a huge detrimental effect on properties and therefore local communities, as we saw in Broadland and North Norwich last year. The northern suburbs of Norwich have experienced substantial housing growth since the 1950s and the surface water drainage systems currently struggle to cope with high rainfall levels.

This funding will allow us to upgrade and improve surface water drainage systems and offer some reassurance to local residents that their quality of life will improve substantially once the work has been carried out

At present, we have outline draft plans identifying those areas around the City where the new drainage systems need to be assessed. Areas of Hellesdon, Old Catton, Sprowston, Thorpe St Andrew and with Norwich City Boundary are currently included within the scope of the project. It is anticipated the installation of a new positive pipework drainage system with new manholes and gulley pots will improve existing arrangements.

During most of 2015 we are undertaking a range of surveys and collating data and information to allow design work to go forward on the assessment of solutions. This will also include computer surface water run off modelling.

Final detailed design will commence in December and run for up to 18 months.

The significant large scale works linked to the project will commence in early 2016 in Sprowston, Thorpe St Andrew, Taverham and Drayton and within the City, some smaller scale works are also planned for this current year. It is intended that all of the proposed works will continue through 2016/17. Further phases in Old Catton and Hellesdon will be constructed during 2017.

We are now able to confirm the first phases of work which will be commence in April 2016, this will be in and around the area of Cozens Hardy Road , Sprowston.

Primarily the work will involve open trench excavation and large diameter pipe laying within the carriageway and several hundred manholes and gulley pots on many of the roads in the areas mentioned. This will cause some disruption to Residents and will be the subject of temporary road

closures and diversion routes. We will aim to minimise the impact of the works where ever possible. There will be dedicated Norfolk County Council Highways supervising staff who will be on hand and contactable if issues arise.

With this in mind, we should be grateful to meet with representatives from your Parish Council to outline the proposals and seek your support and feedback for these important works.

We would like to arrange this meeting for either 7th or 8th of December, at a convenient time for your representatives between 09.00 and 17:00 at the Sprowston Town Council Offices. I would be grateful if you can let me know whether these dates and times are suitable.

Harrisons Wood, Sprowston - Heathland Restoration Project

Report for Sprowston Town Council

10 November 2015

1. Introduction

- 1.1 This report is being presented to Sprowston Town Council for its consideration. It has been produced by Broadland District Council and Norwich Fringe Project.
- 1.2 Whilst Sprowston Town Council has previously stated its approval of and commitment to the heathland restoration element of the wider Harrisons Wood project (in August 2015), the high costs of this work (based on recent quotes from contractors), not to mention ongoing labour costs, have made it necessary to report back to the Town Council to set out the implications and options for taking this work forward.

2. Background

- 2.1 Broadland District Council has employed Norwich Fringe Project to carry out some initial, remedial works in order to ensure that Harrisons Wood is in a suitable state for being opened up to the public at the end of this year.
- 2.2 This follows the publication of a management plan in June 2015 that was produced by Norfolk County Council in consultation with Sprowston Town Council and Broadland District Council. The plan makes several recommendations for work required on site.
- 2.3 The finance for this work comes from a limited loan to Broadland District Council from the Greater Norwich Growth Board. This loan of £35,000 has been agreed for covering the production of the woodland management plan, the initial programme of necessary works resulting from this, and ongoing maintenance. This loan covers 5 years from 2014 to 2019, at which time it is expected that the developers of the White House Farm site will pay a maintenance contribution of approx. £100,000 for the woodland sites to Broadland District Council / Sprowston Town Council. This contribution will obviously cover the re-payment of the loan as well as including some remaining money for ongoing maintenance of the site.
- 2.4 One of the recommendations that the management plan makes (although it is not an element of 'necessary' work for opening the site) is the restoration of an area of heathland in the north-east of Harrisons Wood. The plan states that this area 'has many characteristics of a heathland type habitat' and goes on to list the presence of several species which are typical of heathland areas. The plan also highlights that this area resembles an enclosed section of uncultivated land in this location that is shown on an OS map of 1879-1886. The area is now dominated by 'self-sown' native tree species, although there is an opportunity to



- tailor the management of this part of the site to promote a heathland-type habitat on what was once a part of Mousehold Heath.
- 2.5 The management plan recommends that this area is fenced with stock-proof fencing to limit public access and dog walking.
- 2.6 Following receipt of the management plan, Sprowston Town Council was asked for its view on whether it would like to see this element of the project progressed and, if so, whether it would like to see the area fenced. The restoration would be a long-term, fairly costly project, and fencing (in particular) would obviously incur a significant, additional cost, despite the minimised disturbance that would result on the site.
- 2.7 The response from the Town Council meeting of August 2015 was that the Council would like to see this element of work progressed and that they would like to see the area fenced, with stiles.

3. Issues

- 3.1 The Norwich Fringe Project has asked contractors for quotes to progress the heathland restoration project. The quotes they have subsequently received are far higher than originally expected and the scale of the operation has become more apparent, with the costings just to create the area (incl. tree felling and stump clearance, scraping the site, possible bringing in seed etc) reaching between £15-20,000, with at least another £5,000 needed for the installation of fencing and gates.
- 3.2 These costs don't take into account the ongoing management of the area which will need to be quite intensive. The proposed heathland area is surrounded on both sides by woodland and there is likely to be a seed bank of birch, oak, pine etc. in the ground and seed coming in from the surrounding woodland. There would need to be an ongoing management cost for managing the young saplings. Grazing would be the cheapest solution, although an alternative would be pulling by hand. The costs for using volunteers to do this work could be in the region of £1,500 per year. In the long term the heathland would need managing by grazing or by cutting and topping with a tractor mounted topper or a pedestrian mower.
- 3.3 With these figures in mind, it is clear that this element of the scheme is something that cannot be funded using the loan from the Greater Norwich Growth Board (GNGB), which was agreed on the basis of remedial works and ongoing maintenance. The remedial works needed in order to make the woodland safe and fit for opening to the public have already exceeded the agreed loan from GNGB for this financial year. Therefore this element of the project, if it is to be progressed, will need to be delivered via alternative financial means (e.g. grant schemes for woodland projects).
- 3.4 The management plan recommends fencing the heathland area, to limit public access and dog walking. The plans states that this would reduce disturbance and allow a greater



biodiversity. Whilst this might be true, it is not essential that the area is fenced. The only real reasons to fence off this area would be to allow grazing of the heathland as part of the long-term management or to keep people and dogs out. There are many examples of heathlands which are open to the public (e.g. Mousehold Heath, most locally).

- 3.5 If grazing animals were not to be used to manage the heathland, the long term management (i.e. mowing) would need to be carried out using a tractor mounted topper every 3 to 5 years or more, depending on growing conditions. Having open access to the area, with no fencing, would make this task much easier (and cheaper).
- 3.6 In addition there is a risk that including the element of fencing in this project, thus restricting access to this area, would limit the range of funding opportunities from grant providers. It is very likely that grant providers will want to see the public benefits of such a project, including access to the heathland and particularly access for those with disabilities.
- 3.7 If it is decided that fencing is preferential, then it would be easier to carry out the initial works to the area before any fencing is erected, as this would make it easier for contractors to gain access. There would also be no risk of damaging fencing during the restoration work.
- 3.8 As a slight aside, the management plan also refers to other longer term aspirations for the site, such as a dedicated car park and a BMX track for young people in the area. Clearly, the scale and nature of these projects means that they will also need to be viewed as discreet pieces of work within the wider initiative and, at such a time that the Town Council would like them to be delivered, they will also require funding from an alternative source to the loan that is being provided by GNGB.

4. Options

- 4.1 Clearly there are a number of options for taking this work forward. The starting point is the recognition that the creation and ongoing management of a heathland site will not be particularly cheap, but that it will result in an area which has a very high ecological value and which will have the potential to support reptiles, amphibians, a wide range of invertebrates and nesting birds. The financing for the heathland restoration project would need to be sought via appropriate sources of grant aid.
- 4.2 Sprowston Town Council has the following options:
 - Option 1: Decline to implement the heathland restoration project for the foreseeable future.
 - Option 2: Seek funding to implement the heathland restoration project as previously agreed, including the installation of fencing around the site (with stiles).
 - Option 3: Seek funding to implement the heathland restoration project, but without the added element of fencing.

5. Recommendation

5.1 It is recommended that Sprowston Town Council adopt option 3, to implement the heathland site (without fencing) bringing great ecological benefits to the area whilst allowing public access. This would involve working alongside Broadland District Council officers to seek appropriate funding sources and to plan and deliver the project, with the support of Norwich Fringe Project.





A1151 Route Improvement Works, Sprowston, Rackheath and Wroxham

Work will begin on the 30 November 2015 in three places along the A1151 Wroxham Road between Sprowston Park and Ride and Wroxham.

The three sites are - the layby next to Beeston Lane, the Muck Lane/Swash Lane junction and the unmade layby just south of Wroxham Railway Bridge.

The Beeston Lane Layby works will mainly be lining and tree trimming. Traffic will be controlled using 2 way stop/go boards which will be manually controlled.

At Muck Lane we will be constructing a nearside passing bay on the A1151 Wroxham Road, opposite its junction with Muck Lane. To facilitate the works it will be necessary to close Muck Lane between Wroxham Road and Salhouse Railway Station. This will mean that we can manage the traffic on the Wroxham Road using 2 way lights, keeping any delays to a minimum. A fully signed diversion will be in place and those vehicles which are unable to negotiate Salhouse Railway Bridge will be afforded access via Muck Lane. Gatemen will be on hand to advise drivers.

The third site is the unmade layby just south of the Wroxham Railway Bridge. We will be permanently closing this layby, constructing a farm access and carrying out some lining works. 2 way lights with manual control will be used to manage the traffic.

The works will take approximately 2 weeks to complete. Please note that adverse weather conditions, plant breakdown, and the like, may delay the programme.

The work which will cost £31,000.00 will be carried out by Norfolk County Council's Community and Environmental Services Department and their contractors.

The County Council apologises for any inconvenience the works may cause.
