### 19/271. DECLARATIONS OF DISCLOSABLE PECUNIARY AND OTHER INTERESTS

### 19/272. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE

Written apologies for absence were received and accepted by the Council from Ms D Coleman, Mr I J Mackie, Mr J H Mallen and Ms C T Rumsby.

### 19/273. MINUTES

The Minutes of the Council's meeting held on 9 October 2019, having previously been circulated to all Members were, subject to the following amendment

### 19/274. POLICE LIAISON OFFICER'S REPORT

Norfolk Constabulary's Newsletter was unavailable.

### 19/275. REVIEW SECTION 38 STREET LIGHTING REQUIREMENTS

(1) Halsbury Homes Development - Salhouse Road

The Town Clerk explained that Halsbury Homes Development straddled the parish boundary of Sprowston and Great and Little Plumstead. Having contacted Great and Little Plumstead Parish Clerk he had been advised that their Council do not ask to install and adopt street lighting.

### 19/275. REVIEW SECTION 38 STREET LIGHTING REQUIREMENTS (CONTINUED)

Mr M G Callam suggested that the Council continues to support the adoption of street lighting on the part of the Halsbury Homes development in Sprowston.

(2) David Wilson Homes - Salhouse Road (recorded on the Agenda as Keir Living Ltd)

It was noted that the David Wilson Homes development straddled the parish boundary of Sprowston and Rackheath. The Town Clerk would establish Rackheath Parish Council's policy on installation and adoption of street lighting.

### 19/276. **BUSINESS PLAN**

Further to Minute 19/264, Mr J M Ward reported that the Business Plan Group had met and a draft Business Plan would be presented to Council for consideration at the next meeting.

### 19/277. CORRESPONDENCE

Members noted the email from Steve Shaw, Director Power for People requesting the Council to help their campaign by passing a motion in support of the Local Electricity Bill, and signing up to the campaign.

Concerns were expressed regarding the number of agencies needing to be involved, knowledge of energy safety and legal issues, whether OFGEM compliant, small energy suppliers already out of business as uncompetitive, what would happen if no energy was generated by sun or wind, it was a form of circumventing the planning system.

Mr M G Callam commented that it was just a calling for support for a bill where Councils and other local people could avail themselves of these potential facilities. Mr J F Fisher said the Council would not be committing to anything, the bill was just supporting smaller councils in gaining access to community power.

Mr M G Callam proposed, seconded by Mr Fisher for the Council to support the Local Energy Bill.

On being put to the vote the motion was LOST.

### 19/278. REPORTS FROM COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCILLORS

A written report was received from Mr J M Ward.

Mr J M Ward also verbally reported:

### **Norfolk County Council**

- (1) Norfolk's five-year olds are ahead of the national average 72.5% have achieved a "Good" level compared to 71.8% nationally. This is a big improvement on where we were in 2014.
- (2) last week I had a tour of our 3 County Farms, Care Farms. A well established and growing one at Lingwood, a new one at Mountby (the tenants have only been in for

2 weeks) and the large original Care Farm, Clinks Farm, at Haddiscoe - this latter one works with up to 40 clients 5 days a week.

### **Norfolk Museum Development Foundation**

(3) if anybody would like a free visit to the Castle, as Chairman of the Norfolk Museum Development Foundation I can take in 5 guests free of charge. I am next going to the Castle on Monday 4 November 2019 at 2.00pm so if anybody would like to join me, they are very welcome. I would just get you in, you can then do whatever you wish.

### **Sprowston Town Council**

(4) On Sunday 10 November 2019 I will be representing this Council and doing a reading at the Remembrance Service at St. Mary and St. Margarets Church at 10.45am, all Councillors are welcome to join me.

### Mrs J Leggett verbally reported that:

- (1) having considered the applications for a Beat Manager a formal recruitment was felt not to be required and PC Graham Gill had been appointed.
- (2) she had attended the opening of the new White House Farm School.
- (3) Andrew Frederick Adult Support, for whom Hayley Howes runs the Dementia Café, won the Business Community Support of the Year Award at Broadland Community at Heart Awards.

### Mr J F Fisher verbally reported that:

(1) following concerns previously expressed regarding the Childhood and Family Support Services more people not previously reached were now contacting them using the on-line service.

There were still some play/community groups in the centres run by volunteers

An Ofsted focus inspection had taken place on the front-end service, where first assessments were handled, and it was noted that the service had transformed and was now working well. The previous OFSTED report had stated it was in serious need of improvement.

### Mr N Shaw verbally reported he:

- (1) had attended a Norfolk Rivers Internal Drainage Board meeting.
- (2) had attended a Community Safety Scrutiny meeting where county lines were the main topic. He would send a written report and presentation to the Town Clerk to be disseminated to Councillors.

Referring to Mr Ward's written report, Mr W F Couzens asked how many pupils the new school could accommodate and was there a shortfall of spaces in Norfolk?

### 19/278. REPORTS FROM COUNTY AND DISTRICT COUNCILLORS (CONTINUED)

Mr J F Fisher responded that £1.2m was to buy the site which could accommodate 100 pupils. There were no pupils in Norfolk without a space.

There would be four new schools dealing with different educational needs depending on the requirements of the area and 11 resource bases located within existing schools.

Travelling would be reduced and children not sent out of the county.

The overall spend would be £120m.

Mrs B J Lashley asked if the new schools would be Academy Trusts.

Mr Fisher replied that the land and buildings would be owned by Norfolk County Council and leased to Academy Trusts.

Mrs Lashley asked if the academies would be obliged to take all applicants or could they choose?

In response Mr Fisher stated that available vacancies were advertised and parents could apply. The academy would decide which applicants were offered a placement however, parents could appeal the decision and judiciary would consider if the decision was appropriate.

Mrs B J Lashley reported that since the clocks had changed, the street lights on the A1151, Wroxham Road were lighting up later than those on side roads and requested Norfolk County Councillors to investigate why.

On the motion of Mr J M Ward, seconded by Mr R J Knowles it was **RESOLVED**, that the meeting be adjourned to receive residents' questions on matters concerning the town. Residents were reminded that their questions should be addressed to the Town Mayor who would, assisted by the Town Clerk, reply.

- (1) if there was any further information with regard to the perpetrators of the incident at the petrol station on North Walsham Road;
- (2) why there were only warning signs of ramps in one direction on Foxburrow Road;

SDC Phase 4 was clarified as being Sprowston Diamond Centre Phase Four redevelopment.

Mrs B J Lashley asked if there was any indication of how Chestnut Nursery was performing.

The Town Clerk advised that capacity was at just under 10% at the moment but they were hopeful of 70% by end of first school year.

**RESOLVED** to approve and adopt the Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet and Detailed Income and Expenditure to 30 September 2019.

# Pushing Forward

Over the last six months we have held a successful Conference examining the vexed question of affordable rural housing, continued our lobbying and questioning of local authorities over their policies on new housing, responded to central Government surveys on countryside matters including protection for AONBs, taken out a full-page advert in the EDP to coincide with Climate Strike Day, held a wonderful fundraising summer fair and been treated to a fascinating Annual Lecture at our AGM.

# George Freeman MP headlines CPRE Norfolk Rural Housing Conference

CPRE Norfolk has long campaigned for more affordable rural housing, especially important for local young families. There is currently little incentive for developers to provide this and even then they often wriggle out of even small commitments, exacerbating the problem of a lack of genuinely affordable houses, which is a very pressing local need.

To examine this problem more closely, we held a Rural Housing Conference on 6th September in Dereham, opened for us by George Freeman, MP for mid Norfolk, who fully supported our arguments. He was followed by several expert speakers: Jo Lavis, a specialist in affordable housing, Mark Ashwell North Norfolk District Council Planning Policy Manager, Lois Lane, CPRE national Research and Policy Adviser, Debbie Wildridge, Community Housing Development Manager from Locality, East of England, and David Hook, CPRE Norfolk Chair of Vision for Norfolk Committee.


The speakers were all excellent and we certainly learned a lot. The 80 delegates comprised mainly members of parish and town councils from across the county, so we look forward to more affordable housing schemes being supported and developed.

Many sincere thanks to all the volunteers who helped out on the day, Breckland District Council which supported the event with a welcome grant, the excellent speakers who willingly gave their time, the Tea Post at North Elmham for the wonderful lunch and the Mid Norfolk Railway for the welcome parking at Dereham Station.

Housing continues to dominate our planning issues, with numerous planning applications being submitted for greenfield sites which are not allocated for housing under Local Plans. Given there are sufficient allocated sites in these Local Plans to meet the build rates of developers and satisfy Government targets, there is no need for additional, unplanned and unallocated market housing on greenfield sites. Moreover, there has been enough house-building in most Norfolk areas to ensure that they can demonstrate having a 5-year housing land supply, which is crucial when it comes to preventing speculative applications for housing on unallocated sites. ....ctd....

An example of this is provided by the attempts to build a large housing estate on an unallocated greenfield site off Burgate Lane, outside the village of Poringland in South Norfolk. Here, an initial application to build up to 165 dwellings was submitted in 2017, which was refused permission in April 2018. The developer, Gladman, then appealed against this decision, only to withdraw their appeal a few months later. This was then followed by a new application by the same developer on the same site, for up to 98 houses. CPRE Norfolk objected to both applications with thorough comments focussing on a range of issues including potential harm to landscape character, traffic issues, a perceived lack of community engagement and problems with sustainability.

These factors were in addition to the basic issue of the development being on an unallocated greenfield site outside a village which had already seen a massive increase in new housing and is in an area which can demonstrate that it has a current 5-year housing land supply. At the time of writing (9 October 2019) no date has been set for determination of this second application, reference 2019/1593, but one hopes that it will also be refused permission.

### Proposed Ben Burgess relocation to Swainsthorpe

To date there has been no indication of when this application will be considered by South Norfolk District Council. CPRE Norfolk is opposed to this application as it would potentially lead to many harmful impacts on the countryside, residents and users of the A140. Moreover, if this application is approved it would set a very dangerous precedent as it would drive a coach and horses, not to say a fleet of tractors, through various policies in the Local Plan, leaving one wondering what the point is of having such policies. Understandably, Ben Burgess Ltd. the agricultural machinery supplier, wishes to move away from its current site off Martineau Lane, Norwich, to re-locate to a larger and less congested site. They are seeking to move to a greenfield site next to Swainsthorpe village, adjacent to the A140, claiming that this is the only available site that meets their needs. This is due to the imposition of, CPRE Norfolk argues, largely arbitrary selection critera which have led to this site being chosen, rather than a location already designated for agricultural-industrial use, such as the Harford Bridges industrial park, or the Food Hub a short way along the A47.

CPRE Norfolk considers the Swainsthorpe site to be completely inappropriate for this sort of large-scale industrial use, given the loss of designated countryside it would entail, as well as the



the major problems it would cause for the already-congested A140, the residents of Swainsthorpe and various landscape and environmental issues.

A full objection has been submitted to South Norfolk District Council urging them to refuse permission. Given the ongoing consultation for the new Greater Norwich Local Plan it seems incredible that any largescale industrial application could be considered for land not designated for that use in the current or emerging Local Plan.

### Offshore windfarms and their associated onshore works

While CPRE Norfolk continues to support the generation of electricity by offshore wind power, concerns remain over the unnecessary and continuous damage and disruption caused by onshore works. Primarily these involve cable trenches crossing the countryside and substations ever-increasing in size. Every time a new wind farm comes into operation, new cables are laid. CPRE Norfolk urges adoption of an Offshore Ring Main (ORM) which would hugely decrease the amount of this onshore damage and disruption, as any new windfarms could 'plug into' the ORM.

### **Greater Norwich Local Plan**

There has been a delay in the next phase of public consultation for the GNLP, which now looks to start in January 2020. This appears to be due in part to concerns over a suggested increase in the number of additional new houses to be delivered as part of the plan, from 7,200 to 8,500 - 8,900. CPRE Norfolk is sceptical about the suggestion to have growth in 'village clusters', as this could lead to a loss of village character and significant environmental problems due to more car journeys on increasingly congested roads, as the majority of new residents would need to commute to work, with frequent public transport services being often unavailable.

CPRE Norfolk will continue to campaign for the right type of housing in the right locations, for example by following a 'brownfield first' policy, and by urging all of Norfolk's Local Planning Authorities to prioritise developing sites for housing allocated under current plans before allowing any additional sites to be built-out. This has been and remains the focus of our Norfolk Alliance to which 156 parishes have signed up, equating to 29.8% of Norfolk parishes. 



Norfolk Fire and Rescue Service has just published its draft Integrated Risk Management Plan (IRMP) for 2020-2023. The draft IRMP sets out to identify foreseeable changes in community risks for Norfolk that the fire and rescue service has responsibility for and the strategies we intend to use to mitigate these risks.

The Fire and Rescue Service national context is changing and, following the tragedy of Grenfell Tower, has led to a refocus on our statutory community fire protection services. The proposals for development and change in our draft IRMP are focused on improvement, but before any decisions are made we want to hear your views about your service.

## Report from Councillor John Ward

### **Broadland District Council**

There have been some recent senior staff appointments:- Rodney Fincham as Assistant Director Finance, Simon Phelan as Assistant Director Community Services and Imogen Mole as Conservation Officer.

BDC recently hosted a workshop on County Lines (Drug supply). Criminal gangs have established 20 lines in Norwich which are obviously impacting people in Broadland. The event was one of a number being held around the county and the agreed outcomes will be turned into actions. Teri Munro is our contact at BDC.

At the Full Council meeting on 7<sup>th</sup> November, BDC adopted an Environmental Policy Statement and agreed to review its action plan every 6 months.

Also at the meeting on 7<sup>th</sup> November, it was agreed that the Council would continue in the Norfolk Business Rates Pool despite there being some risk of extra cost if the NHS win its current high court case against business rates which would mean the Councils would have to jointly pick up NHS's share.

### **Norfolk County Council**

Norfolk's gritters made their first run of winter on Monday 28<sup>th</sup> October in the West of the County. 16,000 tonnes of salt are in stock in preparation for winter. More than a third of Norfolk's roads are on the 49 regular gritting routes, a run covering 2,200 miles and taking 3 hours to complete.

As part of NCC's Early Childhood and Family Service, up to £250k is available annually to help new or existing groups provide activities for 0-5yr olds. Groups are invited to apply for grants of up to £2,500 for projects which might include music, creative arts or physical play. Details from:-www.norfolk.gov.uk/earlychildhoodfunding

Norfolk library service has won a bid of £7k to enable it to put on events and be part of the national BBC "Novels that shaped the world" Festival. Norfolk's specific theme is "Coming of Age" which will aim to improve reading skills across communities that have poor literacy.

The County Council has approved the date of 2030 for Norfolk to achieve net zero carbon emissions. This is part of a far reaching environmental policy for the Council.

The Papillon Project has only recently been set up as a Charitable Company, and we are seeking funding to meet our day to day running costs and to be able to register as Charity as soon as possible. This means that we do not have funding at present to support the provision of materials and other set up costs for the allotments we are working with.
