(1) County Deal for Norfolk - Consultation

In response to a question from Mrs B J Lashley, Mr J M Ward explained the County Deal funding of £20m annually for a period of 20 years would not increase with inflation.

A meeting was due to take place between leaders of District Councils and Conservative MP's working to get an improved offer in due course.

Mr W F Couzens reported community drop-in events were being held at Sprowston Library and the Forum.

Council noted Norfolk County Council's invitation to comment on the County Deal for Norfolk and it was agreed Councillors respond to the consultation on an individual basis.

(2) Greater Norwich Plan - Consultation

Council noted the Greater Norwich Local Plan update.

20230186 - replacement wooden dormer windows with double glazed wooden units at 92, Wroxham Road, Sprowston.

20230190 - demolition of single garage and replacement double garage at 23, Lone Barn Road, Sprowston.

20230117 - single storey rear extension with lanterns to replace existing and raise existing garage roof at 58, Barkers Lane, Sprowston.

To oppose the granting of planning application 20230188 - installation of a 17m high slim-line monopole supporting 6 no. antennas, 1 no. wraparound equipment cabinet at the base of the monopole, 2 no. equipment cabinets, 1 no. electric meter cabinet and ancillary development thereto at Grass Verge of Cozens-Hardy Road, Sprowston.

Whilst the Council acknowledges these services are required, they considered the proposed installation of a monopole and associated cabinets at this location to be prejudicial to road safety and pedestrian safety.

The installation of an additional four cabinets to the existing two in the proposed location would obstruct the view to the right of vehicles exiting the Church car park, seriously restricting sight of oncoming traffic from Wroxham Road. Vehicles will have to pull further into the road than they currently do before being sure it is safe to drive away.

The Church car park is heavily used by various community groups, Sprowston Nursery Playgroup and worshippers. It is also a drop off and pick up point for parents of a number of high school students.

The proposed location is close to the junction of Cozens Hardy Road and Wroxham Road, directly opposite the entrance to the Chestnuts. This area is often congested with cars parking on both sides of the road. The addition of maintenance vehicles to service the installation will further exacerbate the situation.

Given the high level of footfall, particularly children of school age, restricting pedestrian access to the verge on this narrow pathway will create a bottleneck and encourage walking in the road.

Residents are prohibited from planting trees, hedges or any plant on the highway verges as they might hinder traffic, cause distraction or reduce visibility. A structure of this scale at this location will certainly achieve all three.

23/065. PLANNING (CONTINUED)

A 17m high monopole would dwarf any other structure in the surrounding area and is out of keeping with the street scene. Locating such an obtrusive structure outside a religious building and place of worship was considered to be insensitive.

Other considerations are potential noise nuisance from fans to visitors at the community Church-garden and inconclusive evidence on the affects to human health.

This newsletter contains information concerning celebratory and community events that will take place over the Coronation Weekend between Saturday 6 and Monday 8 May 2023.

The Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III and Her Majesty The Queen Consort is an occasion for national celebration and unity. The aim of this newsletter is to set out the sequence of events that have been announced as part of a weekend of celebrations, and to help signpost further information and sources of support, for the benefit of local and community leaders, and event organisers in Norfolk. subsequent newsletters will be distributed by the Norfolk Lieutenancy office as further details become clear.

Their Majesties The King and The Queen Consort hope the Coronation Weekend will provide an opportunity to spend time and celebrate with friends, families and communities across the United Kingdom, the Realms and the Commonwealth. Their Majesties are looking forward to marking the occasion with the public throughout 2023.

National Sequence of Events

Saturday 6 May 2023. The Coronation of His Majesty The King and Her Majesty The Queen Consort will take place at Westminster Abbey. The Service will be conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury. the Service will reflect the Monarch's role today and look towards the future, while being rooted in longstanding traditions and pageantry.

Across the Coronation Weekend, there will be further opportunities for people to come together in celebration of the historic occasion.

Sunday 7 May 2023. The Coronation Big Lunch is an initiative at which neighbours and communities are invited to share food and fun together. The Coronation Big Lunch will be overseen and organised by the Big Lunch team at the Eden Project.

Sunday 7 May 2023. A special Coronation Concert will be staged and broadcast live at Windsor Castle by the BBC and BBC Studios, with several thousand pairs of tickets to be made available via public ballot. Those wishing to enter the public ballot for tickets, live until 28 February 2023, can do so here: https://www.ticketmaster.co.uk/coronation-concert

Monday 8 May 2023. Members of the public will be invited to take part in The Big Help Out, which will encourage people to try volunteering for themselves and join the work being undertaken to support their local areas.

Sources of help

The Coronation Big Lunch – The Eden Project will be making available information packs full of ideas, inspiration, top tips and the practical bits to help get your Coronation celebration started. Further details for event organisers can be found here: https://www.edenprojectcommunities.com/the-big-lunch Your Local Authority will be able to advise on the process for requesting road closures.

The Big Help Out – This initiative is being organised by The Together Coalition and a wide range of partners such as the Scouts, the Royal Voluntary Service, and faith groups from across the UK. Further details can be found here https://thebighelpout.org.uk/

The National Lottery Community Fund — The fund is supporting communities across the UK to come together to mark the Coronation. Funding of up to £10,000 is available for Coronation related events and activities via the National Lottery Awards for All programme. The programme does not have a deadline, but it can take up to twelve weeks from the date of application submission for successful groups to receive funding. Local events and activities

All our communities across Norfolk are encouraged to take part in local events and activities – particularly with Big Lunch initiatives, and the Big Help Out. Communities are encouraged to be creative and to adopt their own ideas for celebrating this national moment. As planning gets underway the Norfolk Lieutenancy hopes to build a picture of local events and activities with the aim of enhancing awareness and signposting what is going on in Norfolk. Further details and helpful guidance will be posted on the Lieutenancy website in due course.

In some cases, local authorities and other grant funders may make available grant funding to support specific activities.

It is anticipated that churches and other places of worship will be holding celebratory services on the day before and the day after the Coronation. The Church of England website is expected to provide further details in due course.

Subject: Norwich Western Link project update and introduction from Cllr Graham Plant

Dear all,

This will be the first time that some of you will have heard from me since I have taken over as Cabinet Member for Highways, Transport and Infrastructure from Cllr Martin Wilby. For those of you who aren't aware, Martin has sadly had to step down from this role for health reasons. Martin held this position for several years and oversaw some fantastic improvements to the county's transport networks, so I want to put my thanks to him on record and acknowledge that I have some big shoes to fill.

I'm a longstanding county and borough councillor representing Gorleston in the east of the county. I've also served as Deputy Leader on the county council since 2019, so I have a good understanding of the county's transport needs and priorities, including of course the Norwich Western Link.

I have been getting more up-to-speed on the details in the last few weeks though, including spending a morning last week visiting the area around where the new road would be built. I was really struck by how narrow many of the local roads are, some single track and others not much more than that. And yet there are already thousands of vehicles trying to get through this area from the west to the north of the city every day, and these numbers are expected to increase significantly.

It's clear that these roads were not designed to take this level of traffic, and there are all kinds of knock-on impacts including on road safety, air quality in communities, and longer and less reliable journey times. This will continue to be the case until a high standard alternative route is provided - the Norwich Western Link.

Our current focus on our Norwich Western Link project is on developing and finalising the planning application documents ahead of submitting them to the local planning authority. In our next report to cabinet on the Norwich Western Link, council officers intend to ask cabinet members for approval to submit the planning application for the project. You may be aware that we had originally indicated this would be considered at the upcoming March cabinet meeting.

We want to make sure we have enough information and certainty around the national investment in the project via approval of the project's Outline Business Case to make an informed decision. We've therefore decided to wait to bring a report to cabinet until we have all the information we feel we need to make this decision. I hope we'll be able to confirm which meeting of cabinet the report will be considered at shortly, and I'll email you again at this point.

I understand many people are keen for us to get on and deliver the Norwich Western Link, especially those residents and businesses that are worst affected by the traffic problems to the west of Norwich. We're keen to keep making progress on this much-needed project too. However, it's important that we get this right and waiting to bring this report to cabinet really is the most responsible course of action.

For those of you who responded to our pre-planning application public consultation last year, we still intend to provide a summary of the results in the next cabinet report. The comments we

received, along with lots of other information including advice from statutory bodies and data from our on-site surveys, are all being considered as part of the development of the proposals that will go into our planning application.



We believe you may appreciate an update concerning the DCO application by Equinor for the SEP and DEP offshore windfarm projects. Following the initial questions and hearings held by the Planning Inspectorate Examining Authority (ExA) between 17-20 January 2023 and their subsequent site visits, the ExA issued a list of questions to Equinor on 27 January 2023 which ran to 126 pages. This list formed part of what is referred to as a "Rule 8 Letter" and is a formal part of the DCO application examination. We believe the length of this letter reflects both the thoroughness of the ExA, which is greatly encouraging to our cause, and also the significant shortcomings in the current proposals included by Equinor in their draft DCO. The first deadline for response by the applicant to the points raised was 20 February 2023. This date was also the deadline for us to provide summaries of the points which we raised during the January hearings and to submit Written Representations on specific topics which we wish the ExA to consider.

On behalf of the Norfolk Parishes Movement for an OTN we submitted two papers: one putting forward our case for moving the grid connection point for these projects to an existing substation at Walpole on the Norfolk-Lincolnshire border and; one requesting an immediate halt of the onshore part of the Hornsea Three and the Norfolk Vanguard and Boreas projects, while an independent review of the case for an OTN is carried out. All documents submitted to the ExA, including these papers are now available on the Planning Inspectorate website at: Sheringham and Dudgeon Extension Projects | National Infrastructure Planning (planninginspectorate.gov.uk). However, we attach below the documents we submitted, for

your convenience. Further hearings before the ExA are now scheduled for 22-24 and 29-31 March 2023.

There is still a long way to go with fighting this application. The current public examination process will close on 17° July 2023. The final report and recommendation by the ExA to the Secretary of State (SoS) will be sent 3 months later (although unseen by the public) and the SoS delivers his decision 3 months after that – so by 17° January 2024. We fear it is pretty unlikely (though not impossible) that this DCO application will be refused by the SoS – there is after all a presumption in NSIP applications that they are necessary for the good of the country. However, we are heartened by the approach of this particular Examining Authority panel and we shall continue to use our best efforts to persuade the ExA to take up our call for an OTN with the SoS.

In relation however to their specific consideration of SEP and DEP (the application in front of them), probably the best we can hope for is that they might recommend to the SoS **refusal of the application in its current form** and that the SoSshould take up with National Grid and Equinor the transfer of the grid connection point from Norwich Main to Walpole. The SEP/DEP project has one unique characteristic in terms of Norfolk, in that it is a *near*-

The SEP/DEP project has one unique characteristic in terms of Norfolk, in that it is a *near-shore* wind farm, close to The Wash, and an alternative, much less damaging, onshore grid connection could be made available. There is considerable evidence for the viability of a connection at Walpole or the adjacent Sutton Bridge and written evidence has been submitted to the Examination on this issue from several Interested Parties.

As Walpole is just 7 miles from the coast, this would eliminate the need for the current 60 km cable path and avoid almost all of the cumulative impacts affecting those communities in Norfolk already facing disruption from the Hornsea Three, Norfolk Vanguard and Boreas cable paths.
