# What is Council Tax?

Council Tax is a locally set tax that is charged on domestic properties which helps to pay for the services provided by all the local authorities in your area. These include Broadland District Council (BDC), Norfolk County Council (NCC), the Police and Crime Commissioner for Norfolk and the Town or Parish Council where you live.

# What is a precept?

A Precept is the amount a council requires to fund its operations, after predicted income has been taken into account. This also applies to the Police and Crime Commissioner.

Unlike District or County Councils, Parish and Town Councils do not receive any direct funding from central government and rely on their precept plus any other income they generate from services or facilities they provide.

The precept requirement for each organisation is added together by the District Council and forms the overall Council Tax for each property.

Council Tax is spent on major services including:

- Children's social care (NCC)
- Waste collection and processing (BDC)
- Support for the elderly and vulnerable (BDC & NCC)
- Schools, education and youth services (NCC)
- Preventing homelessness through social housing (BDC)
- Maintaining open spaces (Parish/ Town Councils)
- Roads & highways (NCC)
- Streetlight maintenance Parish/ Town & NCC)
- Fire Service (NCC)
- Planning and building control services (BDC)
- Coroners, registrars, courts and elections (BDC & NCC)
- Street cleaning (BDC)
- Flood defences (NCC)

The council tax paid by you to Sprowston Town Council together with the income generated from our services fund the management and maintenance of:

- 92 allotments
- Sprowston's 10.5-acre cemetery and visitor centre

- 8 parks and playing fields, including football pitches, tennis courts, bowls green and play equipment
- Sprowston Diamond Centre
- The Millennium Woodland
- Over 800 streetlights
- Seating
- Bus shelters
- Additional verge cutting

Future responsibilities will include the play parks, open spaces, car park and skatepark on the White House Farm development when completed. The Councils expected expenditure for 2024/25 is £1,432,379 and will result in a 5.30% increase on a Band D Tax Rate of £6.75 per year (12.9p per week) The Council's predicted 2024/2025 energy costs for our current street lighting stock is £99,000.00. If lanterns are changed to LEDs the projected energy costs would be less than £25,000. The transfer of £288,074 from reserves (existing savings) will fund the replacement of 700 street lights with energy efficient selffault reporting, fully programmable LEDs.

A further transfer of £27,595 from reserves will fund construction of a hard surfaced pathway along the public right of way from Church Lane through Millennium Woodland to Wilks Farm Drive open space.

# Chairman's Chat by Councillor **Bill Couzens**

Hello everyone, what a strange winter we've had with little cold weather to speak of and new shoots now appearing. First, some good news of a couple of projects that are being provided using money the council receives from house builders via CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy). We receive 25% of the levy as we have a Neighbourhood Plan in place. Councils without a Neighbourhood Plan get only 10%.

By the time you read this, our contractors, local firm Draper & Nichols Ltd, will have started work on the new Viking Community Centre on Tills Road. We are looking forward to welcoming you all to the new facility, which should open in November. However, it's an old building which has been left untouched for some time so who knows what the builders will uncover. Our final plans, which were drawn up after consultation with you our residents, can be seen at the Council Offices. There has been a lot of interest from local groups already. High on the list from the survey was a Community Cafe. We'd really love to hear from any local charities or social enterprises who would be prepared to manage it.

You will have seen, no doubt, that the area off Blue Boar Lane opposite the garden centre has been cleared and is being prepared for a recreational area. This will include our long-awaited skate park, also to be provided using CIL and a commuted sum from a previous development. We don't yet have a date for the hand-over of the site to us, from the developers so that we can get started but we will continue to work towards getting it completed as soon as we can. It's with the developers, Broadland District Council and Norfolk County Council at the moment. This is a facility that has been on the "to do" list for as long as I can remember so we are all looking forward to getting it built as soon as we can. We have interest from several local groups who want to help with the design of the area.

Not connected to CIL is the outstanding issue of the gritting of Atlantic Avenue during winter which is still yet be resolved between the developers and Norfolk County Council. The Town Council and new District Councillors are working hard to try to get the issue resolved.

Next on the list of good news is this year's free Summer Fete to be held on The Rec on Saturday 13 July 2024. We had a lot of positive feedback from you following the last two very successful Fetes and this year it will again have lots of free activities for children and some at minimal cost. I've emphasised free because, talking to some of you last year, I found that the potential cost, especially if - like us - you have several children or grandchildren, could be a barrier.

If you are interested in a stall or would like to showcase your group's work in the arena, please contact the Town Council. If you remember last year, we had the Angel Baton Twirlers and the Lowestoft Dog Agility Team, both of which were warmly received. We also had traditional Fete games of egg & spoon races, sack races and three-legged races. This year we have already booked the Foolhardy Circus but more will be very welcome. We also need acts for the music tent too.

One last item before I close. The Town Council will be replacing all our old street lights for new LED lights. These will bring benefits in cost and carbon emission reduction as they use less electricity and are more reliable. They can be better tailored to our needs and that of wildlife; and will be fully managed so that they will be repaired or adjusted more quickly. If you have any views on how your area should be lit (e.g. part time, dimmed or left with exactly the same level) please contact the Town Council.

I'm always happy to talk to you on any subject to do with the Town Council so if you see me out and about feel free to come and say hello. We'd also really love to see more residents at our monthly Town Council meetings held on the fourth Wednesday of every month, 7.30pm at the Council Offices.

## Event opens at 8.30pm, refreshments available.


We encourage people to walk to the event however, there is free parking in the adjacent Church Lane car park.

The cellar will be converted into a large storage area for regular hirers of the centre.

As previously mentioned, this refurbishment project will be entirely funded from Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) receipts from housing development companies who build housing estates in the area. The Council is restricted to spending CIL money on amenities such as parks, woodlands, play areas, community buildings etc. We do not have the legal powers to spend it on provision of Drs. surgery's, dentists or schools which are the responsibility of Integrated Care Boards (NHS), the Local Education Authority (NCC) or the Department of Education. If we do not spend the money within five years it is returned to the developer.
